## Stone Harbor

1. The funds will be used to create programs that will follow all guidelines in our reopening plan. Our reopening plan implemented prevention and mitigation strategies that are consistent with the most recent CDC guidance on reopening schools. These include universal masking, small class sizes, handwashing, respiratory etiquette and enhanced cleaning and sanitization of all facilities.

2. The funds in this grant will allow for the Stone Harbor School to address academic loss through the implementation of evidence based interventions such as summer learning or summer enrichment, extended day comprehensive after-school programs, and extended school year programs. Programs will run based on the availability of staff. Parents will be polled to determine interest in these programs.

Additional ARP ESSER funds will be used to provide professional development for staff members. Training will focus on reading and math differentiation strategies as well as the social and emotional well being of students.

4. How the LEA will ensure that the interventions it implements, including but not limited to the interventions implemented under section 2001(e)(1) of the ARP Act to address the academic impact of lost instructional time, will respond to the academic, social, emotional, and mental health needs of all students, and particularly those students disproportionately impacted by the COVID–19 pandemic, including students from low-income families, students of color, English learners, children with disabilities, students experiencing homelessness, children in foster care, and migratory students. Plans will be reviewed through administrative and faculty meetings, surveys, open public board meetings, and with student input where appropriate.
